INTRODUCTION

Shutting schools to maintain social distancing amidst the COVID-19 crisis was the most logical solution to avoid community transmission. However, this prolonged closure has a disproportionately negative impact on the most vulnerable students.

The schools have closed as part of necessary measures, then children may no longer have that sense of structure and stimulation that is provided by that environment, and now they have less opportunity to be with their friends and get that social support that is essential for good mental well-being.

SITUATION

In this scenario, children are likely to be experiencing worry, stress, psychological distress, anxiety, fear, loneliness.

As the schools were shutdown, the children are unable to find space for mingle with other children, less opportunity for academic related and physical development activities and also no space for entertainment, etc.,

With is the situation, the children are unable to exhibit their talents, due to lack of opportunities the children remained stagnant.

- A total of 320 million learners in India have been adversely affected by the COVID-19 pandemic and have transitioned to e-learning;
- With huge regional and household disparities in access to the internet and technology, this transition has not been possible for all students and educators;
- The rapid shift to e-learning prompted by the pandemic has resurfaced long-standing issues of inequality and a digital divide in India that must be addressed by future economic, education and digitalization policies.

The education system in India is facing a new crisis due to COVID-19. Besides the effect on short-term learning outcomes, extended school closures will result in a loss in human capital and diminished economic opportunities in the long run.

RESPONSE & OUTCOME

While doing consultations with parents, teachers and children, we came to know that, parents feeling bad about their children future due to lack of resources, guidance, support and majority of the parents also not able to support their children due to searching for their livelihood to meet the family basic needs in this pandemic situation. In this juncture, the children integrated development is stagnating. This is the situation, where the children need proper attention towards them, parents support, space to mingle with co-children, etc.,

In this context, the project designed and initiated innovative program i.e. **IGCL** (Intergenerational Coping and Learning) kit to children and parents guide. The kit contains academic, socio-emotional, physical & mental development related material.

To support and assist children and parents, project selected facilitators, trained them on conducting various activities through home visits, small groups in the project locations with the support of parents.

The facilitators are engaging children in literacy, numeracy, story telling and reading, art & craft, roleplays, rhymes, indoor & outdoor games, etc., The children are now utmost joyful and are in mainstream of literacy & numeracy activities with the support of parents, siblings and facilitators.
